Covent Garden is one of the most popular parts of London. Tourists and Londoners, adults and kids – they all enjoy the great shops, restaurants and cafés, and, most of all, they love the street performers. 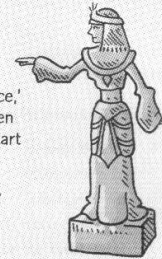
often there are big crowds, and there's a lot of money at the end of the show.
