FOR and SINCE

Often they're used to answer the question HOW LONG?

For - about duration of periods

Since - about when the period started

She's been in advertising for 7 years
We've been here since the beginning of 2017

FOR 10 min, 5 days, 3 months, 2 years, a long time

SINCE 10.15, Monday, last week, I found new work

JUST

Use it to speak about recent events. The exact time isn't mentioned

They've just finished, so you can show him your report

He's just quitted his work and he needs some time to find a new

EVER, NEVER and ALWAYS

Use these phrases to speak
about general experience

As far as you already know, present perfect is used with words or phrases indicating periods of time that haven't finished yet

They are

- TODAY
- THIS WEEK, MORNING, MONTH, YEAR
- SO FAR
- OVER THE LAST FEW WEEKS...
- UP TO NOW
- RECENTLY

Use expressions of duration
like
ALL DAY
HOW LONG...?
FOR

I've been trying to solve it all
morning! It's no go!

She's been cleaning her
desktop

They've been arguing since
noon and still can't nail down

-How long have you been here?
-I've been waiting for 3 hours,
would you believe!

Form

Affirmative

S + have/has + been + present participle
They have been learning English for two years.

Negative

S + have/has + not + been + present participle
They have not been learning English for years.

Interrogative

Have/has + S + been + present participle
Have they been learning English for years?

Usage

Long actions that started in the past and continue until now.
I have been living in Ireland for almost 4 years.

Recent actions that have clear evidence or results now.
Her eyes are red because she has been crying all evening.

Typically used for shorter, more temporary situations.
Have they been learning English for years?
