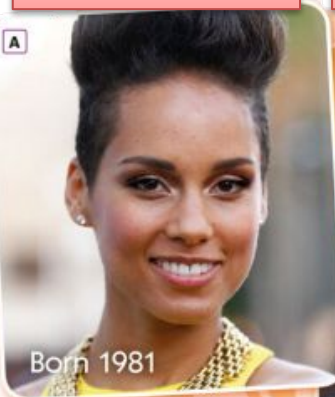

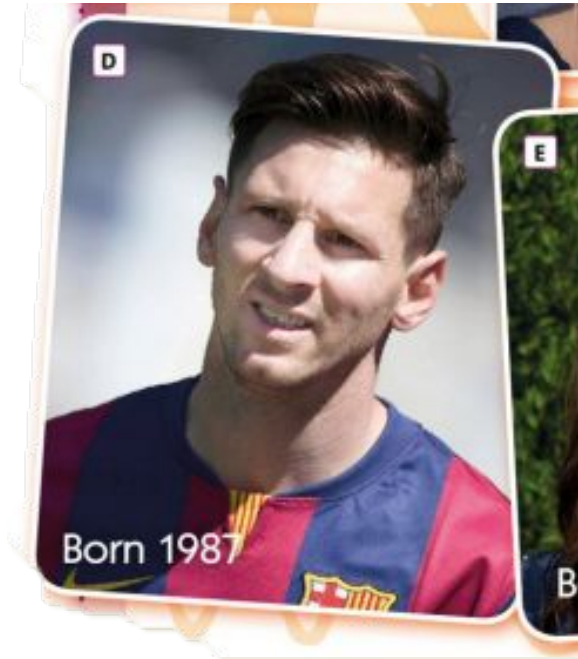

**RECYCLE!** Present perfect and past simple contrast
