Chopin was born in Poland, but at the age of 21, he moved to Paris, France. He was a great composer and an excellent pianist.

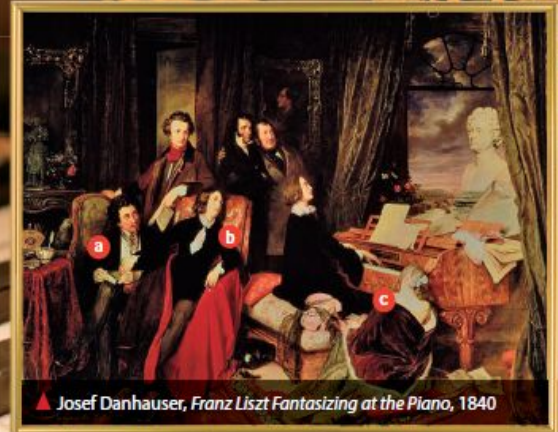


George Sand (1804–1876)

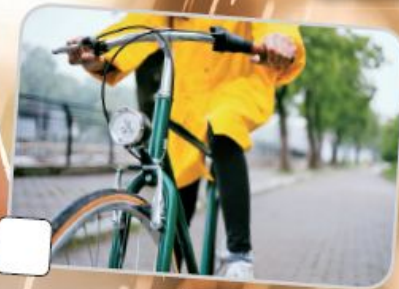

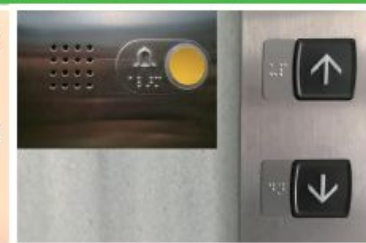

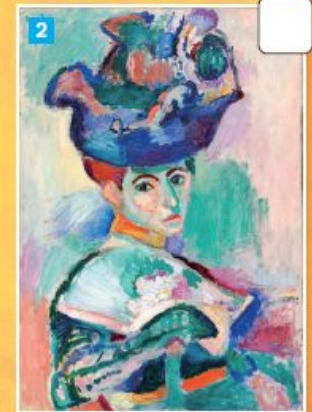

The Growing Danger of Air Pollution



Background Link

Air pollution is gas, dust, and smoke floating in the air. Things that pollute the air are called *pollutants*. What human activities create pollutants?
