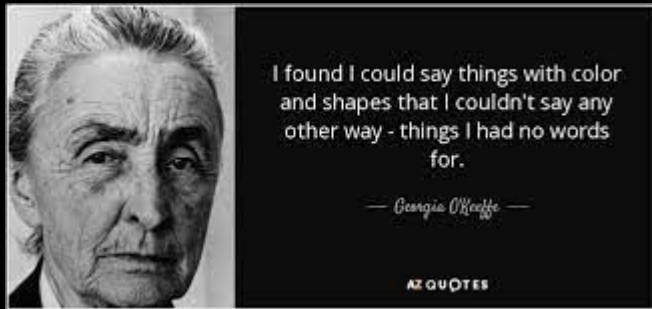


Georgia O'Keeffe

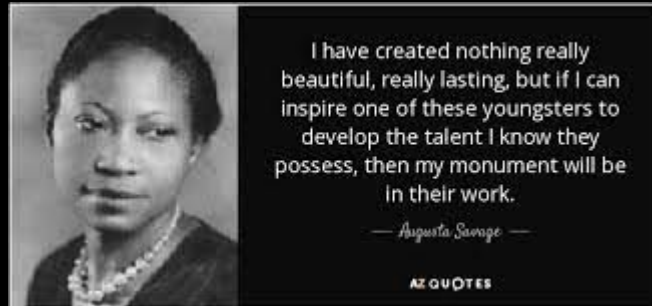


Augusta Savage
