State verbs - cannot usually be continuous

A state means something stays the same.

- ☐ The house is expensive.
- My uncle owns the land.
- The suitcase contains counterfeit money.

Action verbs - can be simple or continuous

An action means something happening.

- DI'm brushing my teeth.
- My uncle is selling the land.
- □Normally we put clothes in a suitcase.
