When we use an adjective with a noun, the adjective goes before the noun: It's a big house. It is a house big.

We can also use adjectives without a noun, after the verb be:

He's strong. It is not easy.

We often use very and quite before adjectives:

He's quite tall. He's very tall.

Adjectives don't change before a plural noun:

They are blue jeans. **They are blues jeans.**

Turn right Slow down **Don't worry Be careful** Turn the air conditioning on **Open your window** Lets stop at that service station Give me my IPod **Be quite** Don't park here Come on Lets go

Imperatives, let's

Use imperatives to give orders or instructions.

- + imperative verb (infinitive)
- Open the door!
- Turn right!
- Imperative don't + verb
- Don't worry!
- Don't stop!

Add please to be polite:

Open the door, please!

• Use be + adjective in imperatives:

Be quite! Be careful, please!

 Don't use a pronoun with imperatives:

Don't worry!

Let's + verb to make suggestions

Let's go home!

Let's not + verb to make a negative suggestion
