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

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

Ministers in secret talks to toughen strike laws

Job cuts prompt fear of union-led disruption

Ministers have held confidential talks over changing union strike laws as the Government prepares plans to shed up to a million public sector jobs.

Philip Hammond, the Transport Secretary, met Boris Johnson ten days ago to discuss the need for new curbs on industrial action supported by only a small proportion of the workforce. The Mayor of London was sounded out because of his experience in dealing with unions during two years in office.

Although Downing Street has said that it has no plans to change union or strike legislation, a Tory source told The Times that the Cabinet is "feeling inclined to be very bullish and aggressive" about confronting strikes.

Ed Davey, the Liberal Democrat minister at the Department for Business, insists that the existing laws work as they stand. But a Cabinet member has confirmed that the coalition intends to re-examine the law if job losses and changes to pay and conditions lead to widespread industrial unrest.

Mr Johnson has called for a change to the minimum turnout for strikes after the RMT rail union's industrial action last year was prompted by a ballot in which less than a third of members voted.

A senior Conservative said that raising the proportion of workers required to vote for a strike before it takes place is under discussion. Mr Hammond is said to be favourable to the idea, and sources suggested wider sympathy

within Government for such a move. In an interview with The Times last

month. David Cameron said of the Trades Union Congress: "You just think: What planet are they living on?

The CBL which represents British business, has argued that industrial action should go ahead only if 40 per cent of the balloted workforce support it as well as a simple majority of voters.

The Government is also under pressure from senior business figures to change the rules to replace striking workers with agency employees, to reduce the time before they can be dismissed without reballoting from twelve to eight weeks—and even to make to eight weeks — and even to make unions legally liable for the consequences of strikes.

Today Danny Alexander, the Chief Secretary to the Treasury, will announce a further cut to this year's public spending, with the largest share of the reductions shouldered by Michael Gove's Department for Education.


It comes after Mr Alexander wrote to Cabinet colleagues to ask them to plan for reductions to their budgets of up to 40 per cent, which unions say could raise the number of public sector job losses to more than a million.

Derek Simpson, of Unite. warned of impending changes to union laws. He said: "More anti-union legislation is almost inevitable. I think it's a a certainty, if we are to be guided by experience.

A source familiar with the government plans said: "At the moment you have union bosses fixing the result. Strike ballots are only advertised with the branches of the union who they know willback industrial action.

Ouite often other union branches are kept completely in the dark." Bob Crow, the general secretary of the RMT accused the Government of con-ducting "scorched-earth economics".

"We are looking at thousands of job losses among the staff who operate and maintain services with dire consequences for passenger safety as corners are cut." he said.
